RE: Support for the Continued Operation of Line 5

Dear Committee Members,

Canada and the United States derive tremendous benefits from our historic cooperation around trade, infrastructure, and supply chains.

Enbridge's Line 5 is an example of existing infrastructure that embodies that mutually beneficial relationship. Shutting down Line 5 – even temporarily – would significantly increase energy costs for residents and businesses and eliminate thousands of well-paying jobs on both sides of the border.

Line 5 supplies roughly half of the oil used by Ontario and Quebec. In Ontario, Line 5 enables the domestic production of gasoline, diesel, jet fuel, and other petroleum products, a far more cost-effective solution than relying on imports from refineries in Ohio, Indiana, and Illinois. Line 5 also supplies crude oil to the Sarnia Petrochemical Manufacturing Complex, which directly employs over 4,900 people and is responsible for an additional 23,500 jobs (approximately one-third of the region's employment).

In addition to petroleum products, Line 5 is also important for the production of natural gas liquids (NGL) at the Sarnia NGL facility. Sarnia's NGL output helps maintain storage levels and peak winter deliverability of propane for heating in Michigan and Ontario.

Line 5 also minimizes the use of other transportation methods such as rail, marine, and truck delivery, which reduces the strain on regional infrastructure as well as the safety risks and environmental impacts associated with moving these products.

The Ontario Chamber of Commerce and the Michigan Chamber of Commerce join businesses across Canada and the United States in urging federal officials to advocate for the continued operation of Line 5 as an economic imperative with their US counterparts. We welcome the opportunity to discuss the issue further.
